GUEST SPEAKER THIS MONTH: VETERANS OMBUDSMAN – GUY PARENT



His topic will be:

The Duties and Mandate of the “Office of Veterans Ombudsman” of Canada

Chief Warrant Officer Guy Parent was appointed as Canada's second Veterans Ombudsman last November.

He was trained as a Search and Rescue Technician and graduated in 1972 with qualification as Paramedic, Master Parachutist, Master Diver, Mountain Climbing Instructor and Survival Instructor.

Appointed as Chief Warrant Officer of Air Command in 1991, he advised on personnel and quality of life issues. In 1995 he was appointed as Chief Warrant Officer of the Canadian Forces which is the highest appointment for a non-commissioned member. In that capacity, he represented 47,000 non-commissioned officers and privates who are, or will soon be, the Veterans of today.

After retiring from the Canadian Forces in 2001, he was drafted by the Office of the Veterans Ombudsman where he served as Director of Research and Investigations until his appointment as Ombudsman. His experience with Veterans Affairs Canada has allowed him to gain significant knowledge about programs, policies, and procedures related to Veterans and to appreciate the importance of the Veterans Ombudsman mandate.

Married for 42 years and fluently bilingual, Chief Warrant Officer Parent now resides in Gatineau with his wife Helena Morris. They have 3 sons, 3 daughters-in-law and 7 grandchildren.

The speaker for our December 13 meeting will be Jamie Lunn of the War Amps of Canada who is a “C.H.A.M.P.” program graduate.

The C.H.A.M.P. program offers financial and emotional support to child amputees and their families.

At the first (and only) stop sign, turn right onto Leacock Way. Follow Leacock Way to its end at Leacock Drive. Kanata United Church is in front of you, across the street.

If full, please park in the large lot of the school next to the church or on the side of Leacock Drive where parking is permitted. ***In fact, unless you have difficulty walking, please consider parking away from the front of the building in order to allow those who may be physically restricted easier access and exit.***
