

Guest Speaker this month:
Terry Currie



His Topic:

***"The Great Fire of 1870
which devastated the Ottawa
Valley"***

"The wind kept getting up," said Fitzroy township native Terry Currie who has written a book entitled "The Ottawa Valley's Great Fire of 1870".

The wind-assisted fire first spread north, missing Pakenham but reaching the outskirts of Arnprior and then Fitzroy Harbour, all in the morning, spreading at a speed difficult for people to avoid, with the wind blowing harder and harder. In the afternoon, the wind shifted and began blowing eastward, with the fire front increasing from the seven mile front experienced in the Fitzroy Harbour area to an 11 mile wide front when the fire reached

the Goulbourn/Stittsville/Bells Corners area. Stittsville was eradicated.

Terry Currie was raised on his family's homestead farm in what was then Fitzroy Township, Carleton County. He likes to say he was born in 1939 and raised in the 1920's because the lifestyle of his childhood was one of subsistence farming with horses, wood heat and coal-oil lamps for lighting. The Currie's lived on the farm settled in 1841 by their great-grandfather Pat, of County Fermanagh in Ireland. They lived in the house built by Terry's grandfather at the end of the nineteenth century. His family were great storytellers and many evenings were whiled away telling incidents and occurrences from the deep past by the light of the lamps.

Terry embarked on a career as a high school teacher at Almonte District High School, where he was Head of the French Department and Head Coach of the Almonte Thunderbolts football team. He married Shirley Anne Jones of Britannia in Ottawa in 1965. They moved to the Currie farm with their four children and lived there a life that Terry describes as "idyllically happy".

During the 1990's Terry wrote two parish histories for local churches. In 2002, widowed and retired, Terry Currie fulfilled a life-long dream by returning to the University of Ottawa to obtain his Master of History degree. His Master's thesis became his first publicly distributed book, "*The Ottawa Valley's Great Fire of 1870*".

Since then he has written or edited two more books and a video documentary, "*St. Peter Celestine Roman Catholic Church, Pakenham: the Jewel of the Ottawa Valley.*" In 2011, as part of the Almonte Lectures series affiliated with Carleton University, he presented a lecture series at Almonte entitled "*A History of the Ottawa Valley*". It was very well received. At this writing, Terry is working on two projects: the first, a history of Chat Falls and Fitzroy Harbour, the second, a book version of his Ottawa Valley history.
