Last month I introduced the topic of Special Interest Groups (SIGs) as a way to establish new relationships. I listed 23 examples (selected from a list of 74) used by other Probus clubs in Ontario.

find SIG signup sheets in the church fover. Some have been pre-titled (e.g. Book Club). Other sheets have blank titles so you can fill in your own special interest. You may provide your contact information on as many sheets as you like.

Once 4 names or more have been collected on a sheet, your executive will forward a copy of this sheet to whomever has identified themselves as willing to be the primary contact by checking the appropriate box on the form. If no contact person is identified, a copy of the sheet will be sent to all signatories with a request that a primary contact be identified so that future interested parties may apply to join, subject to existing group restrictions.

Once initiated, it is up to each group to collectively organize themselves in any way they choose: e.g. in determining meeting locations, dates/times, agendas, meeting frequency, etc.

Our speaker program—upcoming speaker on December 10th

Title: "Passionate Mothers, Powerful Sons; How Mothers Make a Difference"

Summary of Talk:

In 1854, two formidable American women were born in New York. Jennie Jerome (future mother of Winston Churchill) and Sara Delano (future mother of Franklin Delano Roosevelt) grew up with incredible privilege, but refused to settle into the predictable, sheltered lives as the little-known wives of prominent men. Instead, they lived life on their own terms. Their personalities and choices could not have

been more different, but both enabled their sons to reach the epicenter of political power on two continents. Acclaimed historian Charlotte Gray breathes new life into the stories of Jennie and Sara, arguing that the mothers were crucial in shaping the habits and careers of their sons.

Our Speaker:

Charlotte Gray is one of Canada's best-known writers of non-fiction. Born in England, and a graduate of Oxford University and the London School of Economics, Charlotte moved to Canada in 1978 but has also lived in Tokyo, Boston and New York City. She worked as a political commentator, book reviewer and magazine columnist before she turned to biography and popular history.

Passionate Mothers, Powerful Sons is Charlotte's twelfth best-seller. Her previous books include *The Massey Murder; Reluctant Genius: Alexander Graham Bell and the Passion for Invention;* and *Gold Diggers, Striking It Rich in the Klondike. Gold Diggers* was the basis of both a US Discovery Channel docudrama and a PBS documentary.

Charlotte is vice-president of the Sir Winston Churchill Society of Ottawa, has chaired the boards of both Canada's National History Society and the Art Canada Institute, and has frequently served on juries, including for the Weston International Non-fiction Prize, the Cundill International History Prize, Scotiabank Giller Prize, and the RBC Taylor Prize.

An adjunct research professor at Carleton University in Ottawa, she holds five honorary degrees, and is a member of the Order of Canada and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. Her work has appeared in all major Canadian newspapers, the *Guardian*, and the *Smithsonian Magazine*, and she is a regular book reviewer for the *Wall Street Journal*.


