Join us at 10 am on Tuesday, March 11 to hear Tom Zagon speak on

Ice Conditions Along the Northwest Passage: From and Development Section of Canarctic Shipping. He Franklin to the Present Day and Beyond

In 1846. Sir John Franklin's vessels HMS *Erebus* and HMS Terror became trapped in the sea ice of the Northwest Passage. However, today, in the 21st century, vessels transit the Northwest Passage on a regular basis. These regular sailings are possible not only because of changing ice conditions, but also due to other factors such as improvements in ice and weather forecasting, in satellite communication and in Currently he works as an Advisor to the Assistant navigation technology.

In his talk, Tom will demonstrate the role that our modern understanding of sea ice patterns played in shaping the search for Franklin's ships. He will also examine how navigation along the Northwest Passage has changed from the 19th century to the present and look at the implications of changing ice conditions for those travelling both on and through the sea ice.

Our Speaker:

Tom Zagon is a geographer. After graduating from the University of Waterloo in 1995 he joined the Research

worked mostly on navigation support for vessels operating in both Arctic and Antarctic waters, but also on shipping feasibility studies where sea ice is present. In 2008 Tom joined the Canadian Ice Service (CIS) which is part of Environment and Climate Change Canada. The Mission of CIS is to provide timely and accurate information about ice in Canada's navigable waters.

Between 2010 and 2016 Tom was a member of the Franklin Search Team that successfully located HMS Erebus and HMS Terror.





At our February meeting, Louise LeBlance introduced herself and spoke about one of her passions and her appeal for help. Here is what she had to say.

The Doll Project

When I was a little girl, I loved playing with my dolls. In my grownup years, I made doll clothes for my daughter and for other people's daughters and granddaughters. I enjoyed doing that. In 2023, I fell in love with an 18 inch doll I saw at a store. I absolutely had to take her home with me. Ever since then, I have collected 18 inch dolls for myself, but also for girls. I had the idea that a little girl who had to enter a shelter with her mom may get some comfort from having a doll to play with. When a woman and her children seek the protection of a women's shelter, the family is in crisis and I thought that if my passion for dolls could help bring some comfort to a girl, then I should do that. I buy gently used dolls, doll clothes, shoes, doll beds and accessories, and I am donating some of these to women's shelters. I sew doll clothes. and friends have generously made sweaters and blankets for dolls. But, it's a lot of work.

I would love to have help from anyone who can sew, crochet, knit, or who can do crafts with a glue gun. Also, I would love the assistance of anyone who could do repairs to or paint doll beds, as required. Some acquaintances have donated fabric and notions when they have cleaned out their sewing rooms. I have all sorts of patterns I can lend you.

Karsh - Masson Gallery



City of Ottawa

This 1,500 square-foot gallery is proudly named after photographer Yousuf Karsh and painter Henri Masson in honour of their contributions to Canadian art. Exhibitions are selected once every two years by a peer assessment committee.

Karsh-Masson Gallery and City Hall Art Gallery are located on the main level at Ottawa City Hall, 110 Laurier Avenue West. Both galleries are open daily 9 am to 5 pm (excluding holidays) and are wheelchair accessible. Admission is free.

Exhibitions at Karsh-Masson Gallery and City Hall Art Gallery feature the work of professional artists working in all media and include solo, group and curated exhibitions, exhibitions from the diplomatic sector, and circulating exhibitions from other institutions.

Both galleries present a combined total of approximately 8 exhibitions annually, each of which lasts approximately eleven weeks. Annual programming consists of artist talks and tours and an exhibition featuring the City of Ottawa Art Collection. An exhibition related to the Karsh Award is presented every two years at Karsh-Masson Gallery and the next one will occur in 2026.

Ottawa Sport Hall of Fame

The Ottawa Sport Hall of Fame is a non-profit organization, which documents, curates and celebrates outstanding achievement in local sport heritage. The Sport

Hall is overseen by a volunteer Board of Directors to maintain and preserve our rich sporting legacies. Each year, the Hall of Fame Board receives nominations from the public and selects new inductees to be honoured in the Hall. Over 270 of Ottawa's finest athletes, builders and teams have been welcomed into the prestigious Hall of Honour. In 2005, the Hall was moved to the second level concourse at Scotiabank Place where it resided for six years before moving to Ottawa City Hall in 2023.
