#### Highway to the Sky: Women in Aviation History

In 1980, Lola Reid Allin earned her commercial pilot license and became one of very few Canadian women licensed to fly for hire. Lola will highlight the careers of several female pilots and explain the rewards of an aviation career and the challenges faced by women, then and now. She offers several possible reasons why women remain under-represented in commercial aviation (only 5%-7% of pilots are female!) and why aviation or other STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) careers attract few women.

#### Our Speaker:

Lola Reid Allin is a former Airline Transport pilot, pilot examiner, the first female flight instructor at two flight schools (British Columbia and Ontario), and the first woman to fly the Twin Otter for a scheduled air service. She is also a SCUBA Dive Master, and an award-winning author and photographer. To promote the role of women in aviation and to encourage other females to consider aviation careers, Lola is co-lead for the Education and Outreach Committee of the First Canadian Chapter, Ninety-

Nines International Organization of Women Pilots and a speaker with the Northern Lights Aero Foundation and the Eastern Ontario 99s Education and Outreach Committee.

In 2022, she and Robin Hadfield, the president of the International 99s, created the New Track Scholarship, an annual award for female pilots.

She has explored more than 65 countries in depth, lived with four different Maya groups in Central America and Mexico and trekked across Baffin Island and around Manaslu (Nepal), the world's 8<sup>th</sup> tallest mountain. She has summitted Africa's Kilimanjaro

and Toubkal mountains as well as Machu Picchu in Peru.

Her memoir, *Highway to the Sky: An Aviator's Journey* was released in September 2024.

Karsh - Masson Gallery



#### City of Ottawa

This 1,500 square-foot gallery is proudly named after photographer Yousuf Karsh and painter Henri Masson in honour of their contributions to Canadian art. Exhibitions are selected once every two years by a peer assessment committee.

Karsh-Masson Gallery and City Hall Art Gallery are located on the main level at Ottawa City Hall, 110 Laurier Avenue West. Both galleries are open daily 9 am to 5 pm (excluding holidays) and are wheelchair accessible. Admission is free.

Exhibitions at Karsh-Masson Gallery and City Hall Art Gallery feature the work of professional artists working in all media and include solo, group and curated exhibitions, exhibitions from the diplomatic sector, and circulating exhibitions from other institutions.

Both galleries present a combined total of approximately 8 exhibitions annually, each of which lasts approximately eleven weeks. Annual programming consists of artist talks and tours and an exhibition featuring the City of Ottawa Art Collection. An exhibition related to the Karsh Award is presented every two years at Karsh-Masson Gallery and the next one will occur in 2026.

Ottawa Sport Hall of Fame

The Ottawa Sport Hall of Fame is a non-profit organization, which documents, curates and celebrates outstanding achievement in local sport heritage. The Sport Hall is overseen by a volunteer Board of Directors to maintain and preserve our rich sporting legacies. Each year, the Hall of Fame Board receives nominations from the public and selects new inductees to be honoured in the Hall. Over 270 of Ottawa's finest athletes, builders and teams have been welcomed into the prestigious Hall of Honour. In 2005, the Hall was moved to the second level concourse at Scotiabank Place where it resided for six years before moving to Ottawa City Hall in 2023. Admission is free.



At our March meeting, members enjoyed an informative presentation by Tom Zagon about Arctic ice. He explained how its extent varies over time and season, its importance to shipping and the methods used to monitor and forecast its extent. He then used that as a basis to speculate how ice conditions affected the Franklin expedition of 1846. When we think of Arctic ice, we often associate it with icebergs, but Tom explained that sea ice is quite smooth and used by the Inuit for transportation. And, with warmer weather on the way, I am adding new signup sheets for Canoeing, Gardening, Golf, Kayaking and Paddleboarding to see if there is any interest shown before our summer break.

#### **Prime Contacts**

Very few groups have identified a Prime Contact, so to clarify the role again, it is NOT to be responsible for all activities within the group. Rather it is to:

- maintain the email list of current SIG members
- be aware of activities taking place
- be the contact person for any request for more information about the group

#### **Meeting People**

If you are in a SIG with 4 or more people, you have everyone's contact information, but likely have not met most of them. The point of a SIG is to facilitate making new acquaintances. Following are some suggestions that, with minimal effort, may help put faces to those names.

During our monthly coffee time (10-10:30 am) look for names that appear on your group's list and strike up a conversation about your common interest.

Email everyone in your SIG group and suggest a meeting in the sanctuary or foyer at 9:30 on the day of the next regular meeting.

Be specific about location (e.g. just outside the cloak room or beside the band area in the sanctuary). Remind everyone to wear their badge if they have one or acquire a stick-on at the welcome centre.

Email everyone and suggest meeting at a coffee shop at a quiet time. Out of courtesy to the owner, be prepared to order food and drink. Four at a table is optimum for conversation; six is probably the limit.

With the warmer weather, email everyone and suggest a meeting in a park for a picnic, or just a

get together. Everyone brings their own chair, food and drink. Again, be as specific as possible about the meeting location.

If you are planning an outing for yourself, you can invite others to join you at your specific time and place, say at a theatre 30 minutes before the performance (everyone coming buys their own ticket) or at a launching site for kayaks or canoes for a group paddle.

It's unusual for people's schedules to align so do not expect a huge turnout. Anyway, a low turnout may be desirable as you can get to know people better in small groups.
